





'Because You're Worth It!'

A lot of advertising relies on making us feel we deserve to have things, whether we need them or not. Because we're worth it.

If we're honest, deep down many of us feel we're not worth very much at all. Often the very people who seem to have an over inflated sense of their own importance are actually desperately trying to prove their worth to everyone else, and perhaps to themselves.

God sent his son, Jesus, into the world to die and come back to life for us, because to him we're worth it. Not because of anything we have done, not because we deserve it, but because he loves us and wants to help us change our lives.

If you want to know how much you are really worth, look at Jesus Christ hanging on a cross — that's how much God loves you. It's what we call grace — an undeserved free gift flowing from the boundless love of God.

This is the message of Easter, along with the good news that Jesus, who laid down his life for our forgiveness, came back to life to help us follow him into a new way of living and loving. The power of God which brought Jesus back from the dead is available to us today if we accept his offer and ask his help to live his way.

As St Paul wrote to the church in ancient Corinth:

'if anyone is in Christ he is a new creation, the old has gone, the new has come!'

'God demonstrates his own love for us in this: while we were still sinners, Christ died for us'
St Paul's letter to the Christians in Rome, chapter 5, verse 8

Transported into a different place

Since first singing Fauré's Requiem as a University student, it has been one of my favourite choral works. There is a sense in which its luxurious, rich romantic harmonic textures and gorgeous melodies transports me to a different place – a very peaceful place.

Our expanded parish choir will be singing this forty minute work as part of a meditational and, I hope, moving service at 6.30pm on Passion Sunday (2 April). We are especially excited by the fact that we will be joined by a number of former choristers at St Mary's – some of whom have not sung with us for quite a few years!

The French romantic composer Gabriel Fauré (1845-1924) was, amongst other things, Director of the Paris Conservatoire and organist at the famous Église de la Madeleine in Paris (whose list of former organists reads as a who's who of French musical greats). He seems to have written the Requiem 'for pleasure' although it was written between 1887 and 1890, so one imagines that the death of his own parents in 1885 and 1887 respectively must have provided some motivation.

Of course, being a Requiem, it does focus on our own mortality and on Jesus' redeeming death on the cross, so is very appropriate for passiontide.

Perhaps the most famous of the seven movements is the central one, a tranquil soprano solo: Pie Jesu Domine, dona nobis requiem, sempiternam requiem — Merciful Lord Jesus, grant us rest, everlasting rest. (I should explain for those who know the text well that we will be making the tiny amendment throughout of praying for our (nobis) rest rather than theirs (eis), making it altogether more salient for this occasion.) The Old Testament prophet Isaiah tells us that he was 'despised and rejected by men'. Yet the disciple Mary anointed Jesus' feet with perfume; I like to see this song as a fragrant offering but perhaps I am getting carried away!

One of the central themes in the Requiem is the transformation from darkness to light that Jesus brings. The chord with which Fauré begins the whole work is an arresting and dark chord of D minor. It has a very thick texture as a result of its four men's parts, moves at an incredibly slow pace and is sung incredibly softly. By the final chord of the entire work, this has become an almost identical but wholly transformed chord of D major. In both cases it is sung to the word Requiem, translated as 'rest' or perhaps 'peace'. This continual switching from dark, minor chords to light, major ones runs throughout the work and not only means that the choir has to stay alert to its tuning, but reminds us of verses in Paul's letter to the Colossians (1:12,13) in the New Testament:



'...joyfully giving thanks to the Father, who has qualified you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the kingdom of *light*. For he has rescued us from the dominion of *darkness* and brought us into the kingdom of the Son he loves, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.'

What a wonderful promise to the believer!

The dark to light, minor to major theme continues throughout. For example, there is a glorious moment at the end of the second movement, the Offertorium, when, after hammering on in B minor praying to be delivered from the pains of hell and the darkness of the black abyss, a wonderful, translucent peace emerges in the final Amen in B major, so much as to say, your prayer has been answered; rest easy. Or, in the words of movement five, the Agnus Dei (Lamb of God): Lux aeterna luceat nobis, Domine; cum sanctis tuis in aeternum;, quia pius es — Let light eternal shine on us, O Lord; with your saints forever; for You are merciful.

And that redemption, for me, is what our Christian faith is all about.

I am also reminded of the physical symbol recorded in Mark's Gospel when at the moment that Jesus died on the cross 'the curtain of the temple was torn in two from top to bottom.'The curtain physically separated the 'Holy Place' from the 'Most Holy Place' in the temple. Its tearing apart represented God's opening for us of the way back to His glorious and awesome presence, the entering into the light.

I hope that you will come and be transported to a different place by this gorgeous music at 6.30pm on Sunday 2 April. Do join us.

The Joy of Singing Written by Penny Cavan


Choral singing really is a joy, especially for those, like me, who cannot play an instrument but long to make music. There is something very satisfying in being able to do this in the company of others.

A breath of fresh air: A further update on our organ appeal Written by Anselm Frost











ast September we launched an appeal to fund repairs to the wind reservoirs or 'bellows' and other parts in our church organ that have served for up to 120 years.

The Christmas edition of The Link recorded that, because of the superbly generous response to our appeal, the scope of work could be expanded beyond the main 'wind' part of the organ (releathering the main reservoir etc.) to include refurbishing the manuals and replacing the 1970s electronics that transmits the signals from the keyboards to the pipes. The Parochial Church Council has reviewed proposals from three well known organ repair contractors, and has selected Mander Organs of Bethnal Green (subject to finalising the paperwork and receiving approval from the Diocese of the fuller works programme). Mander Organs is run by Noel Mander, who has family roots going back beyond his father starting organ building on his own account in 1936 to an 18th Century organ

builder. The company has worked on a long list of prestigious Cathedral, Church, University college, school and other organs (including the St Paul's Cathedral organ and the Grand Organ in the Royal Albert Hall), and it is regarded as a leading player in the British organ building and repair industry. The work is expected to start in early July and to be completed late in August, in time for the Choir's return from its summer break.

During this period a high quality electronic organ will be used, and part of the North aisle of the nave will be taken up with storing parts of the dismantled organ (as will part of the North gallery). Once the work is completed, the organ will be retuned comprehensively, ready for the Autumn and with the repaired parts ready to serve for many years into the future! The Parochial Church Council would like to reiterate its thanks to those who donated and raised money for our appeal, including Allchurches Trust which made a most welcome grant.

St Paul's Cathedral Choristers' visit to St Mary's

n Sunday 12 March we were treated to Evensong sung by a visiting choir – the trebles of St Paul's Cathedral, 15 strong, with accompanying clergy. This was part of a termly peregrination by St Paul's round the eight deaneries of the Diocese of London. The choir was conducted by their Director of Music, Andrew Carwood, and accompanied on our famous J.C. Bishop organ by the St Paul's Organ Scholar, Joseph Beech. The preacher was the Cathedral's Dean, the Very Reverend Dr David Ison.

The format of the service, following the pattern of the Book of Common Prayer, and with plainsong-style versicles and responses, was familiar to those who regularly attend the 6:30 Evensong held 3 or 4 times a month at St. Mary's. The main difference was that, following Cathedral practice, the Psalm (No.135, verses 1-7), Canticles (Magnificat and Nunc dimittis for trebles in C minor by Sir George Dyson), and Prayers were sung by the choir alone, as of course was the anthem, Long since in Egypt's plenteous land by Parry. A minor difference in the Cathedral-style singing was the slightly incongruous elongation of certain syllables (especially in the aforementioned Versicles and Responses). The congregation joined in wholeheartedly in the hymns: I heard the voice of Jesus say by Horatius Bonar (tune: Kingsfold) and O Jesus, I have promised by John E. Bode (tune: Wolvercote).

Our Area Dean, the Reverend Joe Moffat, Vicar of St Mary with St Alban, Teddington, welcomed us, and gave apologies from the Reverend Rosemary Morton, Minor Canon and Succentor of St Paul's, who was to have been the Officiant, but was unwell; her lines were sung by Mr Carwood. There was a retiring collection for ALMA – the Angola-London-Mozambique Association, forging the London Diocese's companion links in the Anglican Communion. Tea and cakes would be served afterwards – if we were lucky: we were warned that the St Paul's choristers were 'very keen on cake'.

The psalm ('O praise the Lord...') was sung with restrained gusto by the choir, mostly antiphonally, to a chant by Sir George Job Elvey, Organist for 47 years of St George's Chapel, Windsor. He had a reputation as a kind and gentle choirmaster — he never boxed the boys' ears, except when they sang out of tune at Evensong! There was some subtle accompanying word-painting from the organist, notably a stormy crescendo of lightning, wind and rain at the end. Choir and organ imbued Dyson's melodious and energetic *Magnificat* with a jauntiness and innocence that seemed to

me to represent Mary's dignified acceptance in her song while inwardly jumping for joy; while the more relaxed, reflective *Nunc* brought out the quiet, joyful resignation of Simeon's song. Dyson was the father of Freeman Dyson FRS, the quantum physicist, doubtless familiar [among other Dysons] to those at NPL, Bushy Park.

The lessons were read loud and clear by David Stancliffe from our church Bible (Numbers 24:4-9, on God's adoption of the House of Israel); and by The Reverend Gareth Wardell, Vicar of our neighbouring parish in Hampton of All Saints' (Luke 14:27-33, on Jesus's tough words to the crowds on 'taking up their cross'). The Prayers were notable for including both the day's Collect (for guidance on the right path — a sentiment repeated in our closing hymn, which also reflected the sermon) and the penitential Lenten collect for Ash Wednesday. Our own Pat Felstead led the Intercessions — for the Queen; the wellbeing of the world; guidance for church leaders; and especially the world's great needs and unnoticed sorrows. After a short silence for bringing our own prayers before God, we said the General Thanksgiving, and Prayer of St John Chrysostom.

In his Address, the Dean, David Ison, after thanking St Mary's for our hospitality – and cake (on behalf of the choristers – transformed by Mr Carwood 'from little urchins into angels'), concentrated on *budgeting*. From the Chancellor's Budget he discussed Cathedrals' and churches' budgets and resources – and Jesus's teaching about budgeting in the second Lesson: 'Have you counted the cost?'. He also referred to John 6:59-59: many followers could not afford the cost, and went away; and to Hebrews 12:1-2: Jesus endured the Cross for the sake of the joy set before Him. He said that God loves each of us wholeheartedly and without reserve; we should count the cost, but also the joy: 'We are bought with a price,' says St Paul; count the cost of following Christ, for the sake of the joy set before us.

The Anthem, which preceded the sermon, was familiar as being the original form of Parry's lyrical hymn tune Repton (an arrangement for the hymn Dear Lord and Father of mankind) - probably his second most famous tune (after Jerusalem). This was a 'ballad' from Act I, Scene 2 of Parry's oratorio Judith (1888) as sung by Meshullemeth, wife of King Manasseh of Israel (Contralto), which morphs in verse 5 into a trio with two of their sons (Treble) waiting to be sacrificed to the idol Moloch. The St Paul's choir duly sang verses I-4 in unison (v. 3 a variation of the tune), and v.5, a different tune, in three-part harmony. The words, apparently by Parry himself, reflect the vivid Israelitish story, as he termed it, already met in the first lesson. Sir Charles Hubert Hastings Parry (the third knight of the realm among this evening's illustrious composers!) incidentally took composition lessons from Sir George Elvey while at school at Eton, where he also earned the Oxford B.Mus. degree at the age of 18 or 19. He was a protégé of our own organist (back in 1832), S.S. Wesley, and himself supported Sir George Dyson. Though a non-religious 'free-thinker', he was buried in St Paul's Cathedral.

We were blessed at the end by the Area Dean, who encouraged us, joyfully with the grace of God, to take up our cross and follow Him. Choir and clergy trooped out behind the crucifer, Robert Leadbetter, to a suitably Lenten closing Organ Voluntary — Saraband (in modo elegiaco) by Herbert Howells, with some deep and dark elegiac tones; and copious supplies of tea, scones and cakes survived the choristers and put the icing on the service.

These are just a few of the rather mundane tasks that we suddenly found we had to cover!

The end is now in sight and I think we have managed to keep the Church going so that the Church family still feels nurtured and has continued to grow, both in numbers and in their faith.

Safeguarding at St Mary's Written by Nally Fernando

After many years as safeguarding officer for St Mary's, Carrie Lees stood down at the start of the year. I agreed to take on the role. I have had some experience in safeguarding as until recently I was the Child Welfare Officer for Hampton Hill Cricket Club. I believe the parish owes Carrie an immense debt as it is a role that has evolved since it was introduced in the mid-2000s. Safeguarding is often swept under the carpet and forgotten but Carrie tirelessly kept it in the forefront and encouraged St Mary's not to be complacent. Thank you.

Some may find this difficult to read, but I ask you not to think it doesn't matter as nothing has ever happened. When we let our guard down things slip through.

What does safeguarding actually mean? Is it to protect the children and vulnerable adults or the leaders and pastoral care team? Do we, as Christians trying to live as Christ taught us, need it?

Unfortunately, as we hear or read, every day something terrible involving children or vulnerable adults happens. All too often it is church related and it is not any one denomination. Yes, a lot of what is reported is historical, but that does not mean it is not happening today... somewhere.

It is uncomfortable as a Christian to believe someone who is in a leadership role within a religious setting could do such things. I know I sometimes only look at the headline and think I don't want to read that or if I do read it, I cannot comprehend how anyone could do that to another person. The recent BBC drama 'Moorside' based on real events, brought to life what can happen and explode into uncontrollable events.

Safeguarding has become more important in this day of social media and instant access to the internet with smart phones or tablets. Society has changed and what was socially acceptable fifty years ago is not today, but then what is 'socially acceptable'? Has our fear of upsetting someone stopped us caring when we see or hear something? Is the risk of reprisals too great? Are we like the three monkeys, dumb, deaf & blind? How much of what we read is true? Is it backstabbing just because someone has not agreed or been given a bad grade? Is it someone wanting attention and

spreading rumours? Is it a medical condition and someone needs our help and prayers?

I would like to think that we, at St Mary's, are an open church and no-one would be afraid to challenge or come forward if something was clearly wrong or they have concerns. We have a strong pastoral care team. We have a good core of leaders for COSMOS, mini-COSMOS, FAB & our other weekly groups.

We have the strap line of 'Christ's love has the first and last word in everything we do' on all our newsletters and website. The PCC debated long and hard about what the values of St Mary's are to reflect the whole parish taking onboard the recent surveys.

We are the body of Christ:

- † everyone is valued
- * and all have something to offer
- 🕈 as we learn together, and grow to be more like Jesus

We think of this when leading a group or visiting a parishioner.

To go back to my question above, what is safeguarding? I believe that common sense answers a lot of it. The Safeguarding Officer's role is there to help both sides. It is not meant to be a hindrance; it is there for a reason to protect the leaders as well as the children and vulnerable adults. We all have a duty of care to one another so we are all safeguarders. Don't be afraid to contact me through the safeguarding email below if you have concerns. As our core belief says, "Everyone is valued & all have something to offer." Please read our safeguarding policy which is on the website & also at the back of church.

As may have been mentioned elsewhere, we are looking for a Children's Champion; this is not a 'for life' job but something for a two/three year cycle similar to PCC members terms. The role is to promote the children of the parish, to make sure their voice is heard and good practices followed. We are also looking to have an assistant safeguarding officer so we can have both a male and female; more details about this will follow.

Happy Birthday, Davy! Written by Keith Wait

Yes, we are having a birthday party! Down by the river at Hampton, a spring tea party. It is for one of Hampton's most famous residents, one who was called 'the greatest actor of his time and one of the greatest of all time'. And we are having the party in his own garden. All are welcome!

This however is no ordinary party: it is a 300th Birthday party. On 19 February 1717, the wife of a vintner in Hereford gave birth to a son in the Angel Inn. He was to become a poet and playwright, a theatre owner and producer, a collector and patron of the arts, but above all an actor. David Garrick's friends, Samuel Johnson of course, the young James Boswell and Capability Brown will be there, and naturally the ladies, including Peg Woffington and his 'best of all wives' Eva Veigel. All are bound to tell us about their times with Davy.

The venue will be at the Temple to

Shakespeare, built by David Garrick in 1756.

For many years now, local reviewer and playwright, Keith Wait has written a short play for Garrick's Temple, which is performed by St Mary's Drama Group as a rehearsed reading. This year Keith will be joining forces with Nicky Browne, one of our best known local artists, who will

be painting the birthday cards for David Garrick's guests. One of Nicky's favourite subjects is people and places in local history, painted in her own distinctive style. The originals of her David Garrick paintings will be available for sale.

As usual at this gorgeous late spring event, afternoon teas will be offered in the Loggia, the highlight of which are Jean Wood's homemade shortbreads and cakes. What more could Davy want for his birthday treat!







Maundy Money

very Maundy Thursday, the day on which we commemorate the Last Supper of Jesus, The Queen distributes special Maundy money to local pensioners. She visits a

> different Cathedral or Abbey every year, demonstrating her interest and involvement with the people of the UK on a local level. This is a modernday version of an ancient ceremony known in England since around

AD 600.

Early in her reign, The Queen decided Maundy money should not just be distributed to the people of London, and so she now travels to various

cathedrals or abbeys to give gifts to local people.

These special coins have kept much the same form since 1670, and they still bear the portrait of Her Majesty designed for her coronation in 1953, even though the image on ordinary circulating coinage has since been changed four times.

Each recipient of Maundy money is given two small leather purses by The Queen, one red and one white. The first contains a small amount of ordinary coinage which symbolises the Sovereign's gift for food and clothing. The second purse contains Maundy coins up to the value of the Sovereign's age. The coins are legal tender but recipients normally prefer to retain them as a keepsake.

This year The Queen will visit Leicester Cathedral to hand out Maundy Money to 91 men and 91 women during a special service.

Hot Cross Buns

The origin of the hot cross bun predates Christianity. Saxon pagans were known to have a doughy fruited bun which was round, representing the sun, and marked into quarters, representing the four seasons. The Romans too were known to have a round loaf which was marked into quarters although this was probably to make it easier to divide and share.

Quite when they became a Christian Good Friday treat is not clear but there are references to them being eaten by monks as early as the 12th century. The spices in the buns represent the spices used to prepare Jesus's body for burial after his death, the bread-based recipe represents the Last Supper and the cross represents his crucifixion. For centuries they were regarded as good luck charms, with sailors pinning them to the masts of their ships to protect against shipwrecks.

Nowadays hot cross buns are available all year round, but at St Mary's we'll be keeping with tradition and serving them on Good Friday after our 10am All Age Service. Do come and join us.


