



Harvest - Reaping what we Sow

t's probably clichéd in a church magazine at harvest time to talk about how we have lost our connection with nature. We no longer have an innate understanding of where our food comes from and how our produce has been grown. We vicars love to write articles bemoaning such things.

However, it is true! I remember a friend of mine who ministers in the inner city telling of his youth group's humorous reaction to seeing a cow for the first time. I am sure this coming season will see newspaper articles reporting surveys where people were not able to identify that eggs come from chickens, milk from cows or chips from potatoes*.

It is easy to mock the ignorance of others without thinking through what has changed in our culture that means we no longer understand how food comes to be in our cupboards.

Sowing

A couple of years ago I was at the butcher's with one of my young daughters. Keeping in mind my concerns that we no longer understand the providence of our food I decided, on a whim, to invent a game with her. The challenge was to make the animal sound that the piece of meat would have made.

Steak went moo.

Pork, oink.

Lamb, baa.

We had no idea what sound venison made.

This did not go down well with the lady behind me in the queue. She baulked at the idea that I would somehow be sullying the innocence of my daughter by associating the lumps of meat before us with the sounds of a living creature.

A challenge to comprehending where our food comes from is that it involves the transition from life to death. Whether it be meat or vegetable, our food is the result of a seed being stripped from its stem or an animal being herded to slaughter.

Jesus speaks about how seed must fall to the earth to produce a new plant. He specifically describes that grain dying in order that it might produce more.

Reaping

The food that we eat, whether meat or vegetable, comes from the harvesting of something that once was planted or an animal who makes farmyard noises visiting an abattoir. It's not a process that is clean and clinical. It is a process that involves risk. The seed might not grow. The livestock herd may be unhealthy.

We all want more, right? To eat well, to feast. To live a life that is eventful, vibrantly joyful. But so much of what we have is the result of risk. Something being laid down in order that we might have more. There seems to be a theme in the Bible where the great characters of Christianity are called to risk all in order to do more. To leave their homes, to go somewhere risky, or even to give their lives that many others will flourish.

They had to sow, give up, lay down; before they reap and know the result of what they have.

The same is true for us. Do we value ourselves by what we have or by what we give away?

Liberated by God's grace

Marking the 500th anniversary of the beginning of the Reformation Written by David Pimm, Organist and Choir Director

n 31 October 1517, Martin Luther posted his famous 95 Theses that are widely seen as the start of the Reformation. On 29 October 2017, almost 500 years to the day later, we will be holding a Full Choral Evensong to reflect on the significance of the reformation to us today.

The established church of Luther's day had lost touch with some of the teachings of the New Testament and created a system whereby people had to earn God's forgiveness by their right actions and submission to the church. Confession to God could only be made and forgiveness conveyed through the mediation of a priest and ordinary people didn't have access to the Bible in their own language.

Martin Luther was a German Augustinian monk and professor of moral theology at the University of Wittenberg. His protest was initially against the practice of indulgences and took expression in 95 Theses touching on questions of grace, repentance and forgiveness.

For I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners.

Jesus in Matt.9:13

Luther sent the Theses enclosed with a letter to Albert of Brandenburg, the Archbishop of Mainz, on 31 October 1517. Luther may also have posted the Theses on the door of All Saints' Church and other churches in Wittenberg in accordance with University custom on 31 October as he is famously

thought to have done, although historical evidence for that is less clear.


Reaction from church leaders and scholars, at first on a small scale, gathered momentum with lives changed radically in German states and in many countries across Europe. Two years later, King Henry VIII of England started to write his Defence of the Seven Sacraments while he was reading Martin Luther's attack on indulgences. Luther himself composed a reply to King Henry, answered in turn by Thomas More.

For the Son of man came to seek and to save what was lost.

Jesus in Luke 19:10

The reformation gave birth to significant movements in music. Luther himself was a composer; he was a choir boy at the same school and church choir in Eisenach as JS Bach (nearly 200 hundred years apart). The theology of the reformation drove not only the translation of the Bible into local languages but the singing of psalms and spiritual songs in the languages of the people, and in a musical style that worked for ordinary believers both to understand and to join in heartily. In Switzerland and Scotland in particular, but also right across Northern Europe, metrical psalms were sung and in due course, this gave birth to the hymn as we know it.

In England (as well as elsewhere) this also gave birth to the church anthem which set scripture in

a very direct and less elaborate way such that the words could be readily heard and understood. In the hands of composers such as Tye, Redford and, of course, Tallis it was a thing of great beauty as well as being direct and having a crisp rigour and energy. These practices, together with the singing of psalms in English find their home in the Choral Evensong as it developed in English Cathedrals and then in parish churches.

Back in Germany, JS Bach wrote some of the finest music ever, steeped in the Lutheran tradition: Chorale Preludes based on Lutheran Chorales, more than 200 Cantatas and, of course, the exquisite Passions sung in Holy Week.

The music at our Full Choral Evensong can only touch on this vast array of splendid music. In keeping with Luther's desire to make the gospel accessible to ordinary people, our sung music will draw from the

English Reformation, in English. The Magnificat and Nunc dimittis will, I hope, be sung by our expanded choir to Tallis' captivating Dorian setting. However, we will also sing 'A safe stronghold our God is still', translated from the German words written by Luther himself to a melody Ein' Feste Burg composed by Luther and to a harmony by JS Bach. And we will 'top and tail' the service with organ voluntaries by JS Bach based on Lutheran chorales.

But of course, whilst the reformation may have given birth to some great musical traditions, it was really all about our faith. Right at the centre of Luther's insight is fantastically good news: Jesus said: 'For I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners', and 'For the Son of man came to seek and to save what was lost'. Luther was a monk who 'not only applied with the closest diligence to ecclesiastical studies; but also, with the greatest of severity of discipline, he exercised the government of himself' [P. Melanchthon, The Life and Acts of Martin Luther, 1549]. But all his religious endeavours could not give Luther peace and assurance within the theology of his day, until, revisiting both the psalms and the New Testament, Luther encountered the revelation of their true meaning: that he was put right with God, not through his own efforts, but through faith in the completed work of Jesus: 'God proves that it is his justice alone, which he gives through faith, that helps us, the justice which was at the appointed time revealed through the Gospel and, previous to that, was witnessed to by the Law and the Prophets.' [Luther, Preface to Romans, 1545].

That gift through faith is still offered by God today and, I hope that we will first be challenged by it, and then celebrate this wonderful good news at our evensong on 29 October. And if you want to explore this good news further, do think about the Alpha course starting in the church on 2 October (see page 24 for details).

Therefore, since we have been justified through faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have gained access by faith into this grace in which we now stand. And we rejoice in the hope of the glory of God.

Organ repairs complete!

The extensive repairs to the lovely organ at St Mary's are finished (subject to a few minor adjustments), and the instrument is sounding great! The old fairly loud hissing sound of air leaking from wear holes in the main bellows is gone, and our organist, David Pimm, reports that the refurbished keyboard backed by updated electronics is a joy to play.

Last September the Parochial Church Council of St Mary's launched an appeal to raise funds for organ repairs, mainly to the parts of the organ that the maintenance contractor had advised were likely to suffer a terminal failure in the fairly near future. Some of the leatherwork, including that of the huge main wind reservoir ('bellows'), had given about 120 years' service, and had been patched several times. The generosity of the response greatly exceeded expectations, leading to the expansion of the project to include replacing the 1970s electronics taking the signal from keyboard to pipes. Following a short competitive tender process, the repairs by Mander Organs, a prestigious company in the British organ building and repair industry, started late in July this year with the removal to its Bethnal Green workshop of various components. Careful thought was given to how to extract the bellows, and its weight and bulk required a team of six people to lift it out. The components were returned and assembled in mid-August, including two solid state processors in the new electrical transmission and capture system, which a specialist technician had to spend many days on site linking to a complex array of wiring through a meticulous soldering exercise. Following testing and retuning, the handover took place on 25 August. The process was remarkably smooth for a project of its size, coming in on time and at the cost set out in the contract (with no contingencies arising). A short video covering the repair project is on the St Mary's website (www.hampton-church.org.uk), which shows among other things what the interior looks like with and without the bellows.

At the time of publication, a half day of celebratory events will be taking place (on 17 September), starting with an afternoon talk by the Friends of St Mary's on the history of the organ, followed by a short organ recital by our organist David Pimm and the visiting organist Nat Keiller, leading on to a full Choral Evensong.

The PCC would like to reiterate its thanks to donors for their generosity, including Allchurches Trust and The On Organ Fund which made generous grants.

A few final words from David Pimm: 'I am so enjoying playing our repaired organ. With the sound of escaping air from all sorts of components no longer there, the clarity of sounds shines through, reminding us of the beauty and versatility of the pipe work, much of which dates back to 1831. The refurbished keyboard has a very much more precise feel to the player (it had got rather sloppy over the decades); the new registrational aids have opened up possibilities for greater expressivity (that subtle addition or subtraction of a stop) and some combinations of pipes that were not previously possible; the repaired swell box shutters also provide for a greater range of expression. But above all, we have the confidence that we are looking after this lovely instrument well, and that we have leatherwork that will be there to support our singing God's praises for many decades to come.'

Jean Wood awarded the prestigious Swan Accolade at Arts Richmond's Gala evening.



At the glittering Gala Evening of the Swan Awards, Arts Richmond's annual recognition of the best of drama in Richmond-upon-Thames, St Mary's own Jean Wood was surprised and delighted to be awarded The Swan Accolade. This award is given for 'outstanding contributions over many years to the cause of amateur drama in the Borough'. In the fifty plus years of Arts Richmond there have been two dozen such awards made.

Jean Wood was one of the founder members of St Mary's Drama Group (SMDG), which was set up in 1960 by the Young Wives' Group and Women's Fellowship at St Mary's Church. Jean has been active in SMDG throughout the 57 years of its existence. Jean was attending the black-tie event on 10th September to receive two nominations for Black Chiffon, the play she directed just before Easter this year.







Black Chiffon

espite turning ninety, Jean Wood is still going strong as ever. Her direction of another winner for St Mary's Drama Group of Black Chiffon by Lesley Storm was this time staged 'in the round' at the newly refurbished St Mary's Community Hall.

Stage direction of a play 'in the round' needs much careful planning to ensure that no one seat in the audience affords better vantage view than another. This can lead to the actors having to make quite restless movements to change positions but, in the case of this play, the restlessness served to indicate the underlying unease of the characters. The lack of walls and windows, though integral to the plot, are left to the viewers' imagination which, again, serves the play well.

Black Chiffon is a play which requires very strong actors, and these it most certainly had. The central character brilliantly played by Mandy Stenhouse as a mother struggling to come to terms with the forthcoming marriage and departure from the family home of her adored son with whom she has developed a strong bond, was movingly and powerful shown. Her son, still nursing huge anger and resentment against his father who, on his return from the war, had roughly displaced his

son's entrusted role as 'man of the house', was sensitively played by James Henry. The blustering assertive father played by Keith Wait was excellently portrayed. Here was a man who thought that money could buy him whatever he pleased; in this case the services of an eminent doctor to prove that his wife was not of sound mind when she shoplifted from a local department store. Unfortunately, whilst probing into the disturbed mind of his patient, the doctor reveals unexpected hidden psychological depths. The doctor was very plausibly played by Charles Halford with an air of quiet competence and authority. Sue McMillan as the long suffering Nannie, loyal retainer and maid-of-all-works anxiously strove to keep the family calm and carry on in spite of the increasingly puzzling turn of events. Katie Rainbow as the happy fiancée and unwitting cause of her future mother-inlaw's distress and Catherine de Roure as the married daughter of the family were in refreshing contrast to the build-up of underlying family tensions. It is great to see SMDG attracting more younger people to their company which will mean that they can tackle a wider choice of plays.

A good backstage crew provided the set, lighting, sound, costumes and props, all of which combined to make a thoroughly enjoyable production.

Jean Wood is not resting on her laurels. We can look forward to another play under her direction later on this year.
